



Hans Zeiger is working to advance public safety, more local jobs, and restoration for our neighbors who are homeless.

Zeiger previously served in the Washington State Legislature for a decade. In the State House of Representatives, he worked to secure funding to complete state Route 167. He gained a reputation as a bipartisan collaborator, being named by the National Institute for Civil Discourse as co-recipient of the Gabrielle Giffords Award for Civility in State Governance in 2015. In the Senate, he chaired the Senate Early Learning and K-12 Education Committee, co-chaired a task force on poverty reduction, and worked to tackle the homelessness crisis as ranking member on the Housing Stability and Affordability Committee.

Zeiger serves in the Washington Air National Guard. He was previously a Leadership Fellow of the Henry M. Jackson Foundation and a Rodel Fellow of the Aspen Institute.

He is a trustee of the Washington State Historical Society. He is the author of the 2018 book *Puyallup in World War II* and co-editor of the 2021 book *South Hill, Washington: A Community History*.

Hans is the son, grandson, and great grandson of Puyallup teachers. A graduate of Puyallup High School, Hans holds a bachelor's degree from Hillsdale College and a master's in public policy from Pepperdine University. He undertook additional graduate studies in political science at Claremont Graduate University. Hans and his wife Erin are raising their two daughters in Puyallup.
