State of Washington	<p>Initiative Measure No. 1125 State expenditures on transportation This measure would prohibit the use of motor vehicle fund revenue and vehicle toll revenue for non-transportation purposes, and require that road and bridge tolls be set by the legislature and be project-specific.</p>	Simple Majority
State of Washington	<p>Initiative Measure No. 1163 Care workers and services for elderly and disabled people This measure would reinstate background checks, training, and other requirements for long-term care workers and providers, if amended in 2011; and address financial accountability and administrative expenses of the long-term in-home care program.</p>	Simple Majority
State of Washington	<p>Initiative Measure No. 1183 Regulating Liquor This measure would close state liquor stores and sell their assets; license private parties to sell and distribute spirits; set license fees based on sales; regulate licensees; and change regulation of wine distribution.</p>	Simple Majority
State of Washington	<p>Amendment to the State Constitution Senate Joint Resolution No. 8205 Constitutional Amendment on Repealing Article VI, Section 1A The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment concerning an inoperative provision from the state constitution regarding the length of time a voter must reside in Washington to vote for president and vice-president.</p>	Simple Majority

State of Washington	<p>Amendment to the State Constitution Senate Joint Resolution No. 8206 Constitutional Amendment The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment concerning the budget stabilization account maintained in the state treasury. This amendment would require the legislature to transfer additional moneys to the budget stabilization account in each fiscal biennium in which the state has received "extraordinary revenue growth," as defined, with certain limitations.</p>	Simple Majority
Pierce County	<p>Sales and Use Tax Improvements to Pierce County's 9-1-1 Emergency Communication System Pierce County Council passed Resolution No. R2011-87 proposing to fund improvements to the 9-1-1 emergency communication system. If passed, would authorize a county-wide, one-tenth of one percent (0.01%) local sales and use tax to fund costs associated with financing, design, acquisition, construction, equipping, operating, maintaining, remodeling, repairing and re-equipping the county's 9-1-1 emergency communication system and the facilities infrastructure.</p>	Simple Majority
City of Pacific	<p>Street Improvements - Levy Lid Lift The City Council of the City of Pacific, adopted Resolution No. 1076 concerning a property tax levy increase for street improvements. Would increase the regular property tax levy above the increase allowed, to a total rate of \$1.66397/\$1,000 assessed value for collection in 2012 and annual increases for 2013 - 2017.</p>	Simple Majority
Town of South Prairie	<p>Emergency Medical Services Levy The town of South Prairie passed Resolution No. 314, to allow voters to decide whether to renew a regular property tax levy in the amount of 50 cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation for each of six consecutive years, for the purpose of providing emergency medical services.</p>	39 YES votes plus a 60% favorable majority

City of Tacoma	<p>Initiative No. 1 - Marijuana This Initiative amends Tacoma Municipal code title 8 to provide that marijuana or cannabis offenses by the lowest enforcement priority of the City of Tacoma.</p>	Simple Majority
Town of Wilkeson	<p>Emergency Medical services Property Tax Levy Shall the Town of Wilkeson be authorized to impose regular property tax levies of 25 cents or less per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for each of six consecutive years, beginning in 2012, to provide funding for emergency medical services.</p>	45 YES votes plus a 60% favorable majority
