

My prediction is that 70 to 75% of those receiving a ballot will vote, compared to the 14.1% who voted in the September Primary of 1993. Our election costs should also be cut by 30 to 40%. If you prefer voting by mail, please complete and return the form found with your ballot or in the back of this Voters' Pamphlet.

Thank you for giving me the privilege of serving as your Auditor, and please join with me by voting in this Vote-by-Mail Election. Make your vote count.



It is a monstrous bureaucracy that has infringed on property rights, and ignored individual rights. Individual and property rights are the foundation of our nation and must be protected.


Our county needs performance audits. There have never been performance audits because of a loophole in the Charter. This loophole must be eliminated by specific language that requires the commencement of performance audits.







REGISTERING TO VOTE IN PIERCE COUNTY

REGISTRATION QUALIFICATIONS

To register to vote in Pierce County, you must be:

- ★ A citizen of the United States;
- ★ At least 18 years of age by the date of the next election;
- ★ A resident of Pierce County;
- ★ Not presently denied your civil rights as a result of a felony conviction.

REGISTRATION LOCATIONS

You may obtain registration forms at:

- ★ Pierce County Election Department;
- ★ All city and town clerks;
- ★ All public schools;
- ★ All state offices;
- ★ All rural public libraries;
- ★ All city of Tacoma fire stations;
- ★ All manned fire stations in unincorporated Pierce County.

Or, you can have a form mailed to you by calling the Election Department at 591-7430 or 1-800-446-4979 (in WA). To vote at the polls, you must register 30 days before any upcoming election. However, if you have been a resident of Pierce County for at least 30 days prior to an election, you may register to vote by absentee ballot at the Election Department 15 days prior to the election.

MOTOR VOTER REGISTRATION

At the time you acquire or renew your Washington State driver's license, you will have the opportunity to register to vote.

MAIL REGISTRATION

Legislation became effective January 1, 1994, which enables you to register to vote through the mail. You can pick up a mail-in registration form at many public facilities in the county, or call the Election Department to have a form mailed to you. Just fill it out and mail in.

AFTER YOU HAVE REGISTERED

After you have registered, your completed registration card is sent to the Pierce County Election Department to be filed on a computer system. Your districts will be assigned based on the geographical location of your residential address. At the polls, you will only be allowed to vote for candidates and measures that apply to your districts. About three weeks after registering, you will be mailed a voter registration card which shows your polling place, congressional and legislative districts.

NAME CHANGE

If you change your name, you must complete a new registration form. You can come by in person, or call and we will mail you an application.

MOVING

WITHIN PIERCE COUNTY -

You may notify the Election Department in person, by mail, or by phone. Or, you may fill out a "Voter Change of Address" card at your local post office. You will need to supply your old and new addresses, and date of birth.

OUT OF PIERCE COUNTY -

You must re-register to vote in your new county or state. Once registered there, that county or state will cancel your old registration in Pierce County.

CANCELLATION OF REGISTRATION

You will only be removed from the registration files if you fill out a cancellation card or register to vote in another county or state. If a voter is deceased, another voter may fill out a death card to cancel his or her registration. Beginning in 1995, voters not voting at least once every two years will be placed in an "inactive" file. Their registration will not be cancelled.
