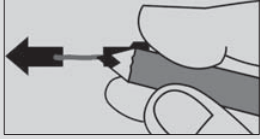


Instructions

Peninsula School District No. 401

Special Election - Prop. No. 1

General Obligation Bonds - \$60,000,000

The Board of Directors of Peninsula School District No. 401 adopted Resolution No. 14-01 concerning general obligation bonds. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will fund new construction, repairs and renovations, student safety and other upgrades to designated schools and facilities throughout the District, and will authorize the District to issue \$60,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum of 20 years and to levy excess property taxes annually to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 14-01. Peninsula School District No. 401

Special Election - Prop. No. 2

Capital Projects and Technology Levy

The Board of Directors of Peninsula School District No. 401 adopted Resolution No. 14-02 concerning capital projects and technology levies. If approved, Proposition No. 2 will fund construction, replacement, upgrading and modernization of educational facilities in the District, including technology improvements, and will authorize the following excess levies on all taxable property within the District; provided, however, if Proposition No. 1 is also approved, the levies authorized by this proposition will be used for technology improvements only and will be reduced as shown below under the columns "Reduced Levy Rate" and "Reduced Levy Amount," all as provided in Resolution No. 14-02:

Property Tax Levy for Maintenance and Operation Expenses

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 21 (Graham Fire & Rescue) adopted Resolution No. 830 concerning a proposition to finance maintenance and operation expenses. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to levy, without regard to the dollar rate and percentage limitations imposed by Ch. 84.52 RCW, a property tax upon all taxable property within the District as follows:

The Board of Fire Commissioners of East Pierce Fire & Rescue (formerly Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 22) adopted Resolution No. 752 concerning a proposition to finance maintenance and operation expenses. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to levy, without regard to the dollar rate and percentage limitations imposed by Ch. 84.52 RCW, a property tax upon all taxable property within the District of:

Precinct Committee Officer
Election of Political Party Precinct Committee Officer

For this office only: In order to vote for precinct committee officer, a partisan office, you must affirm that you are a Democrat or a Republican and may vote only for one candidate from the party you select. Your vote for a candidate affirms your affiliation with the same party as the candidate. This preference is private and will not be matched to your name or shared.

Only contested Precinct Committee Officer races appear on the ballot. If two or more candidates filed for the same office in the same party, they will appear on the Primary ballot.
