Focus on identifying those in your organization who have direct contact with first responders or other agencies during a major incident or disaster. Those who work alongside or in support of an actual incident. The Fact Sheet specifically identifies first-line supervisors. They may be supervisors who manage groups at an incident or who manage single resources that deploy independently (cranes, inspectors, strike teams).</p> <p>The Fact Sheet specifically identifies first-line supervisors (Sergeants/Lieutenants), mid-level management (Captain/Shift Commanders), and command (Battalion Chief/Division Chief/District Commander/PIO) and general staff (Operations/ Planning/ Logistics/Finance-Admin).</p>

They are the ones needing to work with other managers to set priorities, identify available resources, and decide how to deploy those resources for the greatest good.</p> <p>IS-800.B covers the National Response Framework. It doesn't have a Fact Sheet but you can review information about the NRF at: <a href="http://www.fema.gov/emergency/nrf/mainindex.htm">http://www.fema.gov/emergency/nrf/mainindex.htm</a></p> <p>IS-800.B is recommended for officials in Tribal entities and local jurisdictions with overall emergency management responsibilities as dictated by law or ordinance, officials with overall emergency management responsibilities through delegation, and officials primarily involved in emergency planning.</p>

Responders at this level need to understand how the federal response system works to access additional resources and how to manage multiple incidents.</p> <p><b>*Note:</b> Not all persons are required to take ICS-300 &amp; ICS 400 will need to take IS 800.B (NRF). Emergency managers or personnel whose primary responsibility is emergency management must complete this training.</p>

- **IS-701.a Multi-Agency Coordination Systems (MACS)** <http://training.fema.gov/EMIWeb/IS/is701a.asp>  
It is recommended that Federal, State, Tribal and local emergency managers; first responders to include incident commanders from all emergency management disciplines; private industry personnel responsible for coordination activities during a disaster; and personnel of Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD). [Examples: Incident Cmdrs, EOC Mgrs, Section Chiefs, Voluntary Citizen Group Leadership, IMT Mbrs]

This course is designed for Tribal, Local and State public information officers.

The National Integration Center strongly recommends that all elected officials who will be interacting with multiple jurisdictions and agencies during an emergency incident at the minimum complete IS-700: NIMS, An Introduction and ICS-100: Introduction to ICS. These courses provide a basic understanding of the National Incident Management System and the Incident Command System. Everyone directly involved in managing an emergency should understand the command reporting structures, common terminology, and roles and responsibilities inherent in a response operation.

ICS-402 –“ICS for Executives & Senior Officials” – This is a 2-hour session that will acquaint executives and senior officials about how ICS and multi-agency coordination systems can work to ensure a cooperative response. ### National Preparedness

National preparedness is aimed at strengthening the security and resilience of the nation by preparing for the full range of 21st century risks that threaten national security, including weapons of mass destruction, cyber attacks, terrorism, pandemics, transnational threats and catastrophic natural disasters. It is a shared responsibility. As such, the Presidential Policy Directive (PPD-8) is designed to facilitate an integrated, all-of-nation/whole community, capabilities-based approach to preparedness. Involving federal partners, state, local and tribal leaders, the private sector, non-governmental organizations, faith based and community organizations – and most importantly the general public – is vital to keeping people and communities safe and preventing the loss of life and property when disasters strike. PPD-8 sets a strategic vision for national preparedness using a comprehensive approach to preparedness. These include:
