The National Integration Center strongly recommends that all elected officials who will be interacting with multiple jurisdictions and agencies during an emergency incident at the minimum complete IS-700: NIMS, An Introduction and ICS-100: Introduction to ICS. These courses provide a basic understanding of the National Incident Management System and the Incident Command System. Everyone directly involved in managing an emergency should understand the command reporting structures, common terminology, and roles and responsibilities inherent in a response operation.

ICS-402 -"ICS for Executives & Senior Officials" – This is a 2-hour session that will acquaint executives and senior officials about how ICS and multi-agency coordination systems can work to ensure a cooperative response.
