The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 13 adopted Resolution No. 16-290 concerning a proposition to finance maintenance, operations and capital facilities. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will reauthorize the District to impose a regular property tax levy of one dollar (\$1.00) per thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) of assessed valuation for collection in 2017 and will authorize up to a six percent (6%) limit factor for each of the five (5) succeeding years and provide that the dollar amount of the 2021 levy collected in 2022 shall be used to determine future increases as allowed by Chapter 84.55 RCW.
