

Multi-Lingual Emergency Communications Workshop (Hosted by PCEM Outreach on Wednesday, July 18th at the Asia Pacific Cultural Center)

- Establish county and community partnerships to further capabilities in disseminating lifesaving messages by using bi-lingual trusted sources within communities as force multipliers. Government is not always a trusted voice for cultural groups.
 - Provide information on Senate Bill 5046, State and Federal requirements, current communication capabilities and limitations, and existing gaps.
 - Engage in collaborative conversations on developing inclusive and culturally relevant messages
 - Brainstorming community solutions for disseminating timely information in a language in which the community can understand and take action.
- Inform individuals in the community on how they can register to be a trusted community voice and share critical information during disasters.



Intended Outcome: Establish a process for sharing information with individuals who do not communicate in English before, during, and after emergencies and disasters.
