

How to vote




Use a pen to completely fill in the oval to the left of your choice.

Initiative Measure No. 1631

Pierce County Charter Amendments

No. 48 - Biennial (Two-Year) County Budget Cycle

The Pierce County Council passed Ordinance No. 2018-24 concerning amendments to Article 6 of the Charter. If approved, these amendments will change the County budget cycle from an annual (one-year) cycle to a biennial (two-year) cycle commencing January 1, 2020; all as set forth in Ordinance No. 2018-24. Should Proposed Charter Amendment No. 48 be:

No. 49 - Procedures for Initiative, Referendum, Agenda and Charter Amendment Petitions

The Pierce County Council passed Ordinance No. 2018-52 concerning amendments to Article 5 and Article 8 of the Charter. If approved, these amendments will streamline and clarify procedures for filing and processing initiative, agenda, referendum and charter amendment petitions by adding new definition sections; adopting mandatory form and style requirements for petitions; clarifying the computation of procedural time periods and the number of signatures required to validate a petition; eliminating the requirement that the filing officer and the Prosecuting Attorney confer with initiative petitioners; and by making other minor technical corrections; all as provided in Ordinance No. 2018-52. Should Proposed Charter Amendment No. 49 be:

Pierce County Charter Amendments

No. 50 - Filling Vacancies in Elective Offices

The Pierce County Council passed Ordinance No. 2018-50 concerning amendments to Section 4.70 of the Charter. If approved, these amendments will require the Council to fill vacancies in partisan elective offices by appointment from a list of three people submitted by the County central committee of the major political party represented by the official in office immediately prior to the declaration of vacancy. If this official was elected from a non-major political party, or stated no party preference, vacancies must be filled in the same manner as nonpartisan offices; all as provided in Ordinance No. 2018-50. Special Election - Proposition No. 1

Levy Lid Lift

The Board of Trustees of the Pierce County Rural Library District adopted Resolution No. 2018-07 concerning an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to restore its regular property tax levy rate to its fully-authorized level of \$0.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for collection in 2019 to provide stable funding to maintain library services. The 2019 levy dollar amount will be used to compute the limitation for subsequent levies as provided in chapter 84.55 RCW; all as provided in Resolution No. 2018-07. Should Proposition No. 1 be:

Sales and Use Tax for Transportation Improvements

The Governing Body of the Gig Harbor Transportation Benefit District adopted Resolution No. 3 concerning a sales and use tax to fund transportation improvements. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the imposition and collection of a sales and use tax of two-tenths of one percent (0.2%) to be collected from all taxable sales and uses within the District in accordance with RCW 82.14.0455, beginning April 1, 2019, for ten consecutive years, to fund transportation improvements; all as provided in Resolution No. 3. Special Election - Proposition No. 1

The Tacoma City Council passed Resolution No. 40046 concerning Tacoma Creates to support arts, culture, science, and heritage programs. As proposed, Tacoma Creates includes arts, culture, science and heritage programs for youth after school and during summer. Tacoma Creates also offers residents free and discounted access to cultural activities, programs for every neighborhood and age, and expanded services to diverse, underserved and low-income populations. Funding Tacoma Creates is a sales tax increase of one-tenth of one percent, expiring in seven years, beginning January 1, 2019. An average Tacoma household will pay \$13 per year. Should this proposition be:

Bethel School District No. 403

Special Election - Proposition No. 1

General Obligation Bonds - \$443,000,000

The Board of Directors of Bethel School District No. 403 adopted Resolution No. 25(17-18) concerning a proposition to finance construction and renovation of schools. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to: construct one new high school and two new elementary schools; replace Challenger High; renovate Bethel High; renovate and expand Cedarcrest Middle, Evergreen Elementary, Naches Trail Elementary and Elk Plain K-8; make District-wide health, safety, security and other capital improvements; issue no more than \$443,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 25(17-18). Should Proposition No. 1 be:

Special Election - Proposition No. 1

General Obligation Bonds - \$80,000,000

The Board of Fire Commissioners of East Pierce Fire & Rescue ("District") adopted Resolution No. 841 concerning a proposition to finance fire stations, land, vehicles and equipment. If approved, this proposition will authorize the District to: construct 4 new fire stations to replace existing fire stations; acquire land; construct a new fire station in Tehaleh; acquire firefighting and emergency medical service vehicles and equipment; make other capital improvements; issue no more than \$80,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 841. Should Proposition No. 1 be:

Special Election - Proposition No. 1

Six-Year Levy Lid Lift

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 6 (Central Pierce Fire & Rescue) adopted Resolution No. 18-08 concerning an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to restore the previously voter-approved rate of \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2019, thereby exceeding the 1% limitation on annual increases in tax revenues, and allow annual increases of up to 3% annually subject to statutory and constitutional limitations, for each of the succeeding five years. The 2024 levy dollar amount will be used to compute the limitation for subsequent levies; all as provided in Resolution No. 18-08. Should Proposition No. 1 be:

Special Election - Proposition No. 1

Six-Year Levy Lid Lift for Fire Protection Services

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 17 adopted Resolution No. 18-002 concerning an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will restore the previously voter-approved rate of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2019 for fire protection and emergency medical services, thereby exceeding the 1% limitation on annual increases in tax revenues, and allow annual increases of up to 6% annually for each of the succeeding five years, subject to applicable statutory limitations. The 2024 levy dollar amount will be used to compute the limitation for subsequent levies; all as provided in Resolution No. 18-002. Should Proposition No. 1 be:

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 17 adopted Resolution No. 18-003 concerning an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. If approved, Proposition No. 2 will restore the previously voter-approved rate of \$.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2019 for fire protection and emergency medical services, thereby exceeding the 1% limitation on annual increases in tax revenues, and allow annual increases of up to 6% annually for each of the succeeding five years, subject to applicable statutory limitations. The 2024 levy dollar amount will be used to compute the limitation for subsequent levies; all as provided in Resolution No. 18-003. Should Proposition No. 2 be:
