EMERGENCY **ORDER #2**PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY ORDER
REGARDING JURY TRIALS

This matter comes before the Court again on the COVID-19 public health emergency in Washington State.

- I. On February 29, 2020, Governor Jay Inslee declared a state of emergency due to the public health emergency posed by COVID-19.
- II. On March 4, 2020, Washington Supreme Court Chief Justice Debra Stephens entered an Emergency Order that states, in part, as follows:

WHEREAS: During this state of emergency, it may become necessary for courts in these counties to close, relocate, or otherwise significantly modify their regular operations; and

WHEREAS: the presiding judges in these counties need sufficient authority to effectively administer their courts in response to this state of emergency, including authority to adopt, modify, and suspend court rules and orders as warranted to address the emergency conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the Court's authority to administer justice and to ensure the safety of court personnel, litigants, and the public,

## IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

- 1. The Presiding Judges of the Washington courts are authorized to adopt, modify, and suspend court rules and orders, and to take further actions concerning court operations, as warranted to address the current public health emergency;
- 2. Each court shall immediately transmit copies of emergency local rules adopted or modified to address the public health emergency to the Administrative Office of the Courts in Lieu of the requirements of General Rule 7;
- 3. Each court that closes pursuant to this Order or General Rule 21 shall sign an administrative order closing the court, file the original with the clerk of the affected court, and notify the Administrative Office of the Courts as soon as practicable.
- III. On March 11, 2020 the governor issued the follow executive proclamation and order:

**FURTHERMORE**, based on the above situation and under the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(b) and RCW 43.06.220(1)(h), to help preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, I hereby prohibit the following activities in King, Pierce and Snohomish counties related to social, spiritual, and recreational gatherings, which restrictions shall remain in effect until midnight on March 31, 2020, unless extended beyond that date:

Gatherings of 250 people or more for social, spiritual and recreational activities including, but not limited to, community, civic, public, leisure, faith-based, or sporting events; parades; concerts; festivals; conventions; fundraisers; and similar activities.

Violators of this order may be subject to criminal penalties pursuant to RCW 43.06.220(5).

- IV. On March 12, 2020, Governor Inslee ordered all K-12 public and private schools closed in Pierce County until April 24, 2020.
- V. The COVID-19 virus poses a credible, serious health risk to the public, the litigants and the court personnel. It is a responsibility of the court to balance the administration of justice while taking all reasonable steps to help curtail the transmission and spread of the COVID-19 virus.

Now therefore, under the authority granted by Chief Justice Stephens' Order and the authority as the Pierce County Superior Court Presiding Judge;

## IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that:

- A. All criminal and civil jury trails are continued until at least April 24, 2020. The time period of the continuances required by this Emergency Order will be excluded in computing the time for trial pursuant to CrR 3.3(e)(3) and CrR 3.3(f)(2). The Court finds that any delays for the time for trial are the result of compliance with this order are/were unforeseeable due to the health crisis caused by the COVID-19 virus and are therefore are excluded from computing time for trial by CrR3.3(e)(8),
- B. This Emergency Oder shall not apply to any jury trials that are currently in progress.
- C. This Emergency Order does not excuse any party or attorney from the obligation to appear before the court at the time and on the dates set it any existing scheduling order.
  Note: This order does not alter the authority of the court to issue a warrant for a defendant who does not appear in court on the date and time as previously ordered.
- D. The court will remain open and fully operational. All nonjury trial matters including, without limitation all family law cases, are not affected by this order. Those case shall proceed as currently scheduled.
